After such a long wait, gentle giant Griffin now has a huge fenced yard to play in, a home of his own where he is truly loved.



## The Happiest Day is Adoption Day!

t CVHS, our best days are adoption days. We do over 900 adoptions a year. That is 900 animals who are safe and warm in a new home, 900 animals who have a new sofa to sleep on, 900 new families created. Pets come to us bewildered, tired, cold, sometimes starving, sometimes in pain. We are gratified that we are able to take them in, warm them up, feed them, take away discomfort, heal their pain, and give them a second chance at love and a home. Like Snoop, who came to us as a stray cat with eye deformities. His people love him



just the way he is! Or Bear, adopted as a puppy and now gets to be "Erin's Best Friend." Or Buttercup (shown here), who spent most of her life in a crate, sometimes standing in her own urine. She now has free run of her new home and gets to sleep on a cushy sofa. Or one heartbreaker, little Gracie came to us with a shattered leg. It was so bad the leg had to be amputated. Gracie doesn't miss it, she zooms around the house, now pain-free. Every animal is special, and every adoption is special. Thank you for helping make it all possible!

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## Our Open Door/Open Heart Policy = Lot's O'Animals

ur doors and our hearts are open to the people and animals in Vermont who need us. We see the effects of people problems such as financial crisis, homelessness, the aging population and more on animals, leaving pets vulnerable. CVHS is often the "last-chance" for animals. On any given day, we do not know how or where we will be needed. In the last nine months, we have responded to three large-scale animal crisis where local families were faced with

terrible problems and CVHS was asked to help. In our latest case, we took in 30 cats from one home, including three nursing moms with kittens. This is an enormous job for our little shelter whose capacity is only 50 cats and 16 dogs. There is no other organization in central Vermont who can help with these large-scale rescues, CVHS is it. So, we roll with the roller coaster, always caring for the animals who need us.



We also often open our doors to animals from animal shelters all over Vermont, shelters that do not have many resources and the only other option is euthanasia. Just this March, we got a call from a shelter in northern Vermont that did not have the resources to deal with a pregnant dog named Ellie. We took her in, prepared to deal with whatever

happens. Caring for this momma dog was a 24/7 job for the foster family who took her in for us. Of course the pups decided it was time to come into the world at 2:00AM, and CVHS Operations Director Erika Holm rushed over to assist. All seven pups survived, Ellie and pups are doing well.

If you are reading this, you support our work. You are the reason we can say "yes"

## It Takes a Village to Go the Extra Mile for Animals

t CVHS, we go the extra mile for animals – even when that means needing to provide significant medical care for nearly 30% of the animals who come to us. How do we accomplish this? With amazing support from an entire network of medical people, our very own humane village!

Every week, either Erika Bruner of Heart of Vermont or Paul Alfarone of Bear Swamp Veterinary Services visit CVHS to assess the health of the animals in our care. They are instrumental in ensuring all of our animals stay happy and healthy while they wait for their new homes. We also ensure that animals at CVHS get all important dental care if needed. So many arrive here in pain due to bad teeth. Susan Tullar of Bradford Veterinary Clinic has been key in performing frequent dental procedures for CVHS animals, relieving them of

pain and helping them get adopted. And Pamela Krausz and everyone at VT-CAN make it possible for us to spay or neuter every animal before they are adopted from CVHS – helping to reduce overpopulation and unwanted litters in Vermont.

And a story to warm your heart ... recently Lolly Cochran, a new Board member and retired veterinarian, was fostering tiny puppy Blondie. Blondie was on medication for what we thought was a simple bladder infection. But two days later, Blondie became lethargic and wouldn't eat. Lolly rushed her to Onion River Animal

Hospital (ORAH), where another one of our new Board members, Colleen Bloom, realized that Blondie needed emergency surgery. Colleen called the owner of ORAH, Karen Bradley, who rushed in on her day off to perform the surgery, saving her life! Blondie is now called Ruby and is making her new people very happy with her puppy antics. It indeed takes a whole humane village to save these precious animals!
